### Stephen's Farewell

Today, as I sit down to write, is a day that has come with a surreal sense, "Is this really the last newsletter article I will ever write as Director of NCCC?" The answer is, yes.

"Where has all the time gone?" My mother, who passed away almost 15 years ago made this comment when she was visiting the big yellow farm house for the last time (a home she grew up in and lived in for the majority of her 89 years). We were both sitting silently, alone together in the front room, when she offered this comment, "It seems like a dream." Today seems like a dream. Twenty-five years at NCCC have come and

gone in a flash. Sometimes moments have been agonizingly long, but the years have been short. Two particular memories, of my deepest heart-felt desires, come to mind today. First, we go back about 42 years to a memory of a contract, written and signed by me with God. The contract, not my own idea but modeled by a mentor, was written out on a simple, white sheet of lined paper giving ownership of my life to the Trinity. Second, the memory of a prayer bubbling up in my deepest parts of my soul about how I wanted my life to turn out. The second memory about a particular passage, Isaiah 43:4-7, and my prayer that followed was, "Oh God, this is what I want for the time you give me here on Earth." God accepted the contract and that heart-felt prayer. My life has been His. However, the totally unexpected shaping of my life that followed was an utter surprise; even though Scripture clearly predicted what it would mean, only time and the experience of life would deepen the truths predicted.

The poem that follows has some of the most accurate words to my experience that shaped the last 42 years.

I asked God for strength, that I might achieve;
I was made weak, that I might learn humbly to obey.
I asked for health, that I might do greater things;
I was given infirmity, that I might do better things.
I asked for riches, that I might be happy;
I was given poverty, that I might be wise.
I asked for power, that I might have the praise of men;
I was given weakness, that I might feel the need of God.
I asked for all things, that I might enjoy life;
I was given life, that I might enjoy all things.
I got nothing that I asked for, but everything I hoped for.
Almost despite myself, my unspoken prayers were answered.
I am among all men most richly blessed.

#### Giving God Thanks—for Blessings and Provision

Northland Christian Counseling Center (NCCC) was officially formed in 1992 following years of passionate development under the guidance of the Greater Grand Forks Evangelical Pastors Fellowship (EPF). The EPF identified the need in the community for biblically-based, professional counseling services as a ministry of, and to, the area churches.

Several years later, with God's grace and leading, NCCC sought a fulltime Executive Director that could provide counseling services and lead the organization. At this same time Stephen Seay was completing his credentialing as a Licensed Professional Clinical Counselor, while also working with Campus Crusade for Christ (now CRU) at the University of North Dakota in Grand Forks. Stephen, originally from Newtown, ND had recently finished his Master of Arts in Biblical Counseling from Colorado Christian University in 1991-1992, had been on Campus Crusade for Christ staff for 16 years in various capacities and had a bachelor of science degree in Animal Science from North Dakota State University in 1979. Stephen started in early 1996 as a part time Executive Director/Counselor and it soon grew into a full-time position in June 1996 where he has faithfully served in that position ever since.

Stephen's leadership, influence and ministry have defined NCCC over the past 25 years. This is reflected in his heart to love and understand people wherever they are, his desire to share and lead people to God's Good News (The Gospel) wherever they are, and his humility of position and power to be able to boldly engage with people wherever they are.

His heart to love, desire to share, and humility to engage others wherever they have left an indelible mark on the ministry of NCCC. These character qualities have led to 25 years of faithful ministry at NCCC, which in recent years has been summarized as a ministry of "Restoration". The vision of "Restoration" is a ministry of coming along side, guiding, encouraging, and leading people (who are all created in God's image) to be a part of God's restoring journey here on this earth and ultimately to an eternity of full Restoration.

The NCCC Board has been encouraged and blessed by Stephen's friendship, leadership, example, teaching and service. Thankfully Stephen will continue to serve as a Counselor at NCCC after his retirement as Executive Director.

# **Our Growth**



Any family, that meets the criteria, is granted **up to \$620 per family per year** from the client assistance fund (CAF).

There is a saying that one of our past Board members would say, "It seems like we are living in a miracle" and that statement is as true today as it was at Northland Christian Counseling Center in 1996.

In 1996 Stephen Seay was our only clinician. We were struggling financially to even pay our bills and we were housed in a very small office. That first year we moved to a local church office and paid no rent (we probably couldn't have afforded it). Stephen saw 8-10 clients a week and on a suggested donation basis of \$50/ hr. Fast forward to 2021 and we now have eight clinicians practicing in-person and telehealth.

Our administrative staff to support the ministry is outstanding! There are now seven people laboring together with the clinicians to do the ministry at Northland Christian Counseling Center. Some are the receptionists that meet the public in ways that are as valuable as anything our clinicians do.

Our dream is to keep moving in the same directions we have always moved: opening up new locations as the need dictates; adding new clinicians; reaching out into the city, region and beyond with educational programs including guest speakers, therapeutic services that could someday include a lay counseling ministry that addresses "first year of marriage" problems, and possibly a recovery program.

The need for what we do is great. We want to continue to fit into what the church was envisioned to be in the new testament. We are part of what the Spirit has created to meet the needs of a lost and broken world. We are grateful to be a part of conveying the gospel message. We are deeply grateful to be a part of this ongoing miracle at Northland Christian Counseling Center.
